And check into the superb array of free concerts provided by TCU, TWU and UNT. I had some of my older students attend a TCU opera production and in the words of the young - 'they were blown away!'

Watch for the reduced price ticket sales offered by the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra and the free concerts they offer at two different locations. The Fort Worth Ballet and Fort Worth Chamber Music Society offer special student rates. The FWSO offers special student rates as well as a Student Passport, which provides ten (10) concerts for \$35.00!! Fort Worth Civic Orchestra asks for any contribution you can afford.

Let's encourage our students to attend the free concerts at TCU or TWU this Spring semester. Make a start - spring into action! The smallest contribution we make as advocates for the Arts, will serve to strengthen and preserve music and the Arts in American culture nationally and beyond.

Youth Duo-Piano Contest

Texas Wesleyan University holds its annual Youth Duo-Piano Contest on Saturday, February 3, 2018.

The Texas Wesleyan University Youth Duo-Piano Competition is a celebration of young pianists and the skilled collaboration between two such performers. Contestants perform before a live audience as they are being adjudicated. The event is co-sponsored by the Texas Wesleyan University Department of Music and the Fort Worth Piano Teachers Forum.

The Fort Worth Civic Orchestra Holds its Annual Concerto Competition

Talented young musicians will have a chance to perform in concert as guest soloist with a symphony orchestra through the Young Musicians Concerto Competition. The annual Competition, sponsored by the Fort Worth Civic Orchestra, is open to student musicians through 12th grade who play an orchestral instrument or piano. Applicants must be residents of Tarrant, Parker, Johnson, Hood, Ellis, Wise or Denton counties, and past first prizewinners are ineligible to re-enter.

The Competition is accepting applications now through February 23, 2018. The entrance fee is \$30, and forms are available online at <http://fwco.org/wp-content/uploads/2017/09/Young-Musicians-Concerto-Competition-Application-Form-2018.pdf>.

Applicants must submit a recording of themselves performing their concerto. Selected students will perform a movement of that concerto before a panel of judges. The screening panel reserves the right to reject a concerto for appropriateness.

The first prizewinner will receive a \$500 honorarium; the second prizewinner receives \$250.

The Young Musicians' Concerto Competition will be held on Saturday, March 17, 2018 at Cowden Hall on the campus of the Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. The winner will be invited to perform the movement of his or her chosen concerto with the Fort Worth Civic Orchestra at its annual spring concert on Saturday, May 5, 2018 in Truett Auditorium at the Seminary. Note: The winner will forfeit the honorarium award if unable to perform at the concert.

The Fort Worth Civic Orchestra is an all-amateur adult community orchestra led by Music Director Kurt Sprenger.
